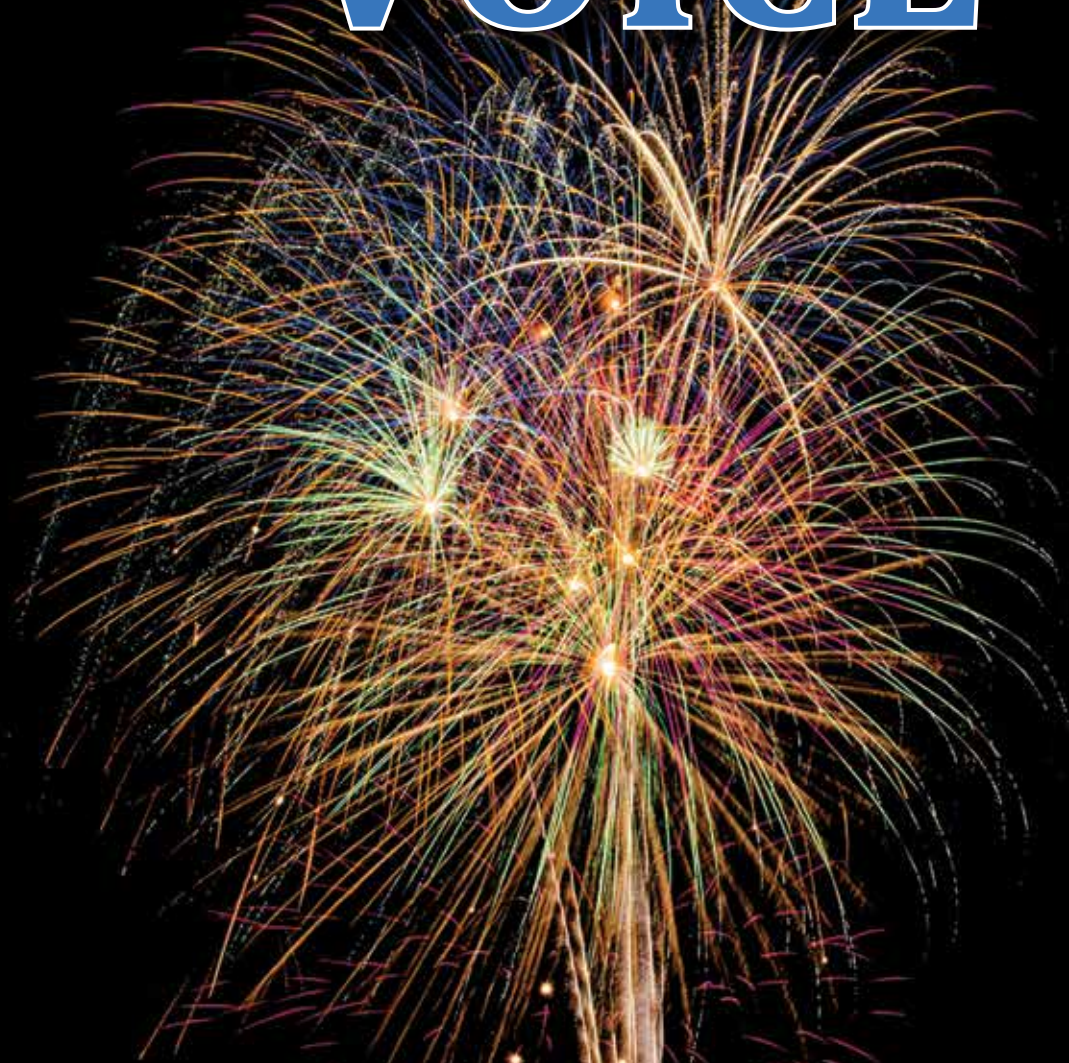

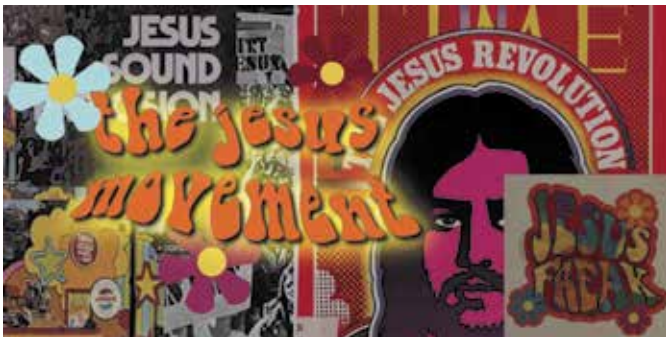

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July 12, 2022

Vernon's premier summer event, July in the Sky, returns Tuesday July 12 with a host of family-friendly activities, music and food in Downtown Rockville and Henry Park. The rain date is July 13.

Activities begin at 6 p.m. in both locations and the evening culminates with a spectacular fireworks display fired from Fox Hill Tower in Henry Park. The best spots to watch are in Downtown Rockville and Henry Park.

The Vernon Parks and Recreation Department, in partnership with the Rockville Downtown Association, is organizing this year's events. The Parks and Recreation Department handles events in Henry Park and the Rockville Downtown Association is organizing events in Downtown Rockville.

There will be bounce houses, a rock climbing wall and other attractions.

In addition to Rockville's restaurants, a variety of food vendors will set up booths and serve a variety of treats. Food vendors will also set up in Henry Park.

Admission to Henry Park is \$10 per car and \$2 per walker. There is no charge to enjoy the fireworks from Downtown Rockville and there are prime viewing spots along East Main Street, St. Bernard's Terrace, Park Place and in Central Park.

No pets, alcohol, bicycles, skateboards, fireworks or sparklers are permitted in Henry Park, or in Downtown Rockville. Bicycles and other non-powered vehicles are permitted in Downtown Rockville if they are participating in the "Push, Pull and Pedal Patriotic Parade."

The Town of Vernon Fire Department, like all fire departments, has multiple companies within its organization, each with its own job function. For example, an Engine Company has specific duties that it performs on the fire ground different than that of an Aerial Company. Together, all the companies work in unison to get the emergency mitigated quickly, effectively and safely. Although not engaging in traditional firefighting or rescue activities, the Fire Police Company plays an important part in ensuring both the safety of the firefighters working as well as the public on and around the emergency scene.

Fire Police Captain Chris Prue, provided the following information on the roles and responsibilities of the TVFD Fire Police Company:

"Our job is to keep first responders and the public safe by setting up safe work areas and enforcing crowd control when necessary. During an emergency it is our duty to keep the public away from any hazards so that the other fire department members are able to focus on their task without having to keep an eye on the public. During events such as July in the Sky and other community happenings, our company is utilized to assist the police department with controlling traffic so they can focus on other tasks and community relationship building. Fire Police officers are certified in traffic control and traffic incident management systems to allow us to understand traffic patterns and flow. Our company is made up of a Captain, two Lieutenants, and nine officers."

Captain Prue also wants the community to remember: "If there is a fire incident in the road or neighborhood you live in with the road blocked off, please stop and speak with the Fire Police member or police officer about how you can get home. Many times once we can verify your address we may be able to allow you to get closer to the scene as long as it is safe to do so."

We know emergency scenes can be a disruption that may cause you delays and inconveniences but please be mindful of our Fire Police members and follow their

Have you ever wondered about the quaint white farmhouse located on the corner of Valley Falls Road and directly across from the red barn? Many people assume the circa 1850 house and scenic property are a private farm. However, it is actually owned by the Friends of Valley Falls, a non-profit that will soon open a Heritage Center on the eight-acre property.

The Friends started in 1972 when a group of seven Vernon women began taking nature walks in Valley Falls Park. The park was not well known, and its landscape was wild and untouched. The group met weekly to compare notes and share discoveries, and realized the park held many natural treasures that should be protected.

As more residents discovered the park, its popularity grew, as did the Friends organization. In 1977 the Friends became an advisory group to Vernon's Recreation Commission and monitored park conditions. During the '80s and '90s it worked with the Parks and Recreation Department and sponsored environmental studies, organized nature walks,

and developed a park management plan. In the late 1990s the Friends restored the red barn and guided the installation of a Braille Trail by Eagle Scouts.

In 2000 Valley Falls Farm was put up for sale. Concerned that the farmhouse and its historic outbuildings would be razed by a developer, the Friends undertook a successful fundraising effort and purchased the property with its farmhouse, stable and outbuildings.

In 2012, the State of Connecticut provided \$150,000 to help restore

the buildings and create a Heritage Center in the stable. Furnished with agricultural and household items once used at Valley Falls Farm, the Center and its outbuildings tell the story about the people who once lived there and how they used the land.

The Friends of Valley Falls is always seeking new members and active volunteers to help at the farm. Yearly membership levels include: Individual, \$15; Family, \$25; Contributing, \$50; and Benefactor, \$100. To assist in preserving this scenic and historic property, donations to the "Valley Falls Farm Fund" endowment fund are also welcome. The Friends is non-profit so donations are tax-deductible.

TAX COLLECTOR

Important Reminder: Tax Payments Due July 1, 2022

Collector of Revenue, Town of Vernon

Taxes are due July 1, 2022 on the Grand List of October 1, 2021. If you have not received your bill(s) by July 1, 2022 please check online or contact the Collectors Office for assistance.

MOTOR VEHICLE TAXES

Motor Vehicle Taxes must be paid in full on or before August 1, 2022 after which the tax becomes delinquent, subject to interest and will be reported to the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles as provided by Law.

REAL ESTATE AND PERSONAL PROPERTY

Each Real Estate and Personal Property bill totaling \$100.00 must be paid in full on or before August 1, 2022. Taxpayers whose tax bills are over \$100.00 have the option of paying the full amount due or the First Installment by August 1, 2022. Failure to pay by August 1, 2022 renders the installment delinquent and subject to interest. Taxpayers must pay the second installment due January 1, 2023 on or before February 1, 2023 to avoid penalties.

Failure to pay on or before August 1, 2022, will render bills delinquent

and subject to interest at the rate of 1 ½% per month from the due date of July 1, 2022. Minimum interest charge is \$2.00.

Please pay online at www.vernon-ct.gov, ECHECK option is free of charge for your convenience. Debit and Credit payments are accepted online. Mail payments to: P.O. Box 387, Vernon CT or in the Office, 8 Park Place, Vernon, CT Monday through Wednesday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.; Thursday 8:30 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.; and Friday 8:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

Vernon Agriculture Science and Technology Students Grow Fresh Produce to be Served in Rockville High School Cafeteria

You've heard of 'Farm to Table.' How about 'Farm to Cafeteria Tray?'

The Vernon Public Schools are taking the "farm to table" movement to a new level. Students in Rockville High School's Agriculture Science and Technology (ASTE) program are growing cucumbers and lettuce their classmates will enjoy in the school cafeteria.

You might call it farm to cafeteria tray.

Project Homegrown is a partnership between the Vernon Public Schools' Food and Nutrition Department and the ASTE program, and in addition to growing fresh produce includes the composting of kitchen scraps from the cafeteria. The compost is added to the soil used to grow the fresh produce.

"I have been thinking a lot about the ASTE program and how we could work together," said Elizabeth Fisher,

Director of Food and Nutrition for the Vernon Public Schools. "I reached out to Erika Bahler, who is the director, and asked if they'd be interested in starting a collaboration and Erika said 'absolutely.'"

The impetus was a grant program through the North Central District Health Department to encourage farm to school programs and to help cover costs, which consisted largely of vegetable seeds, bins for vegetable scraps, and other supplies.

On May 4, 2022 Rockville High Senior Jessica Donovan harvested the first cucumbers. Junior Troy Balsewicz made a first cutting of the lettuce he and his teachers and classmates grew.

When the weather gets warmer, the ASTE students will also grow cherry tomatoes in a garden they have prepared. The garden club will continue to grow food through the summer and fall for the Vernon Schools nutrition program.

"I can't think of a better way to reinforce for the Rockville High School community the important contributions of the ASTE program and agriculture in general," Vernon Schools Superintendent Dr. Joseph Macary said. "Our students will be enjoying fresh vegetables grown by their friends just a few hundred feet from where they are eating. This is great for everybody."

Bahler said students in horticulture classes and the after school garden club are enthusiastic about providing classmates with hyper-locally sourced lunches in the

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At Rockville High School, students in the Culinary Arts Program, led by Chef Lessard, have the opportunity to have hands-on experiences in the kitchen which teach the students skills that they are sure to use daily.

Last year, Chef Lessard began hosting "Guest Chefs" to come into the kitchen to teach students how to make a dish of their choice. On April 26th, they had the pleasure of hosting their very own Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Macary. Students worked alongside Dr. Macary to make chicken kabobs. The class enjoyed getting to work and speak with their Superintendent.



They appreciated that he took time to prepare and eat a meal with them but they especially valued the one-on-one conversations that they had with him.

These "Guest Chef" experiences are not only wonderful opportunities for Rockville High School students but also for the staff members. It's rewarding to see the students apply skills they have learned in other classes. The connections and memories that the staff and students make together in the kitchen at Rockville High School are key ingredients for a successful high school career!

cafeteria and showing off what they do at ASTE.

"They're excited about the fact that what they are growing is going to be in their school lunch, that they're going to find it in the school cafeteria when they get lunch each day," Bahler said.

"It's great to have fresh produce that is locally grown," Donovan said, adding locally-grown food is easier to transport and helps reduce air pollution and greenhouse gases. "You get to see where the food you grow goes and

the affect it has on your community. Other students also get to see what we've been doing in the ag program."

Donovan snipped the cucumbers from their vine, which is growing in an ASTE greenhouse. Teacher Erika Bahler helped her determine which cucumbers were ready to be picked and which need some more growing time.

Bahler showed Balsewicz how to cut the lettuce, also grown in a green house, then he finished the job, placing the mixed greens in a bucket for delivery to the cafeteria.

"It's a really nice opportunity to be able to do this," Balsewicz said. "We're able to provide something for the school and our fellow students get to see what the ag program is doing. Many of the people over there really don't know what goes on over here."

And while the Vernon Public Schools Food and Nutrition Department uses locally grown produce as much as

possible, the produce grown by the ASTE students takes it a new level.

"You can't get any fresher than next door," Bahler said.

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Foundation Testing Program Available for Homes Built Between 1983 and 2015 in Vernon, Ellington and Stafford

Testing can Provide Confirmation of Pyrrhotite or Peace of Mind

A free program that tests foundations for the presence of the mineral pyrrhotite has been extended through February 28th, 2023 and is available to qualifying residents of Vernon, Ellington and Stafford.

The Regional Crumbling Foundations Testing Program covers the cost of testing a foundation for the presence of pyrrhotite, which when exposed to water and air causes the expansion and deterioration of surrounding concrete and can cause structures such as home foundations to fail.

As many as 34,000 homes constructed in northeastern Connecticut between 1983 and 2000 may have concrete foundations containing pyrrhotite and are at risk of cracking or crumbling. The testing program covers the \$3,500 cost to test the concrete in a foundation for the presence of pyrrhotite.

"Testing can confirm that you have a problem and allow you to begin the process of correcting it," Vernon Mayor Dan Champagne said. "It can also confirm that you do not have a problem and give you both peace of

mind and an official determination that your foundation is not affected by pyrrhotite."

Under the testing program, homeowners receive comprehensive visual and core testing of the foundation and a written report about the results.

Funding for the program comes from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and is administered through the State Department of Housing through the Small Cities Community Development Block Grant program. The funding is available as a public service program which requires that 51 percent of the participants be low to moderate income households. A household of four people must have an income of less than \$89,400. The income for a three-person household must be less than \$80,500, and for a two-person household it must be less than \$71,550. The figure is \$62,600 for a single person household.

Households that exceed that income limit can also apply, but can only represent 49 percent of the program's participants. Vernon currently has a number of such households waiting to receive testing because more low-

moderate income households are needed to apply.

"People who are thinking about selling their home are going to have to have their foundation tested and this program is an opportunity to have the grant cover that cost," said Matt Hellman, Vernon's Director of Social Services. "Obtaining a negative test result will give you the comfort of knowing this is not an issue you need to worry about and will give you the official determination you can pass on to a person buying your home. With funds only guaranteed through next February, people who want testing should contact us immediately."

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The Northern Connecticut Land Trust (NCLT) is dedicated to preserving and protecting natural resources in the northeastern region of Connecticut; sponsoring outdoor activities to enjoy the protected lands; and supporting efforts to improve local habitats, maintain farmland and extend recreational opportunities.

NCLT was formed in 1997 from the merger of the Vernon Land Trust and the Four Town Land Trust, both of which started in 1987. Today it serves Andover, East Windsor, Ellington, Enfield, Somers, Stafford, Tolland and Vernon and currently owns more than 1,800 acres valued at more than \$7 million.

In Vernon NCLT owns and maintains more than 100 acres on seven properties, including Eckers Pond behind Vernon Center Middle School, the Webster Preserve above Valley Falls Park, and the beautiful Talcott Ravine. Most are open to hiking and enjoyment of nature and are contiguous with other town or state open areas.

NCLT leads an annual May canoe outing on Upper Bolton Lake, a fall walk at the Webster Preserve (October 17 this year) and after three years our Talcottville/Talcott Ravine Hike will be held on Saturday, September 24.

This very popular three-mile history and nature hike begins at the parking lot of the Talcottville Congregational Church in Talcottville and includes the Talcottville Historic District, NCLT's Talcott Ravine, the Dobson Mills, the Hop River Rail-Trail, and the Talcottville Civil War Monument. The hike will be led by Gail Faherty from NCLT, Susan Barlow, Manchester Town Historian and local historian Jon Roe.

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Renter's Rebate, Back to School, Farmers' Market Vouchers, Energy Assistance

Vernon Social Services has a number of programs available to serve individuals. Some are available now and others will be available in the near future.

Renters' Rebate

The State of Connecticut provides a reimbursement program for renters who are elderly or totally disabled, and whose incomes do not exceed certain limits. Persons renting an apartment or room, or living in cooperative housing or a mobile home, are eligible. The rebate amount is based on a graduated income scale and the amount of rent and utility payments (excluding telephone) made in the 2021 calendar year. Vernon renters age 65 and older, or 18 and older and receiving Social Security Disability, should call (860) 870-3661 for information. The program runs April through September.

Back to School Program

This program supports families in need who have Vernon Public School students in grades Pre-K through eighth. Gift cards are provided to purchase new clothes for the upcoming school year. Sign-ups began at the end of June

and run through the middle of August. People wishing to make gift card donations are asked to contact Social Services by phone or by email at socialservices@vernon-ct.gov.

Farmers' Market Vouchers

The Town of Vernon is a local coordinating agency for the distribution of the Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (SFMNP) check booklets to eligible participants who are 60 or older and meet income guidelines. The program runs July through October. Look for more information in the coming months on the town's website, vernon-ct.gov.

Energy Assistance

This federally-funded program, which helps low to moderate income residents with heating costs during the winter months, will begin in mid-August. Starting in August, residents can call Social Services to get information about materials needed to complete the application process.

When the warmer weather hits, there's nothing better than the smell of food on the grill.

Seven out of every 10 adults in the U.S. have a grill or smoker, which translates to a lot of tasty meals. But it also means there's an increased risk of home fires.

In 2014-2018, fire departments went to an annual average of 8,900 home fires involving grills, hibachis or barbecues per year, including 3,900 structure fires and 4,900 outside or unclassified fires.

Grilling fire facts

- July is the peak month for grill fires (18%), including both structure, outdoor or unclassified fires, followed by June (15%), May (13%) and August (12%).
- In 2014-2018, an average of 19,700 patients per year went to emergency rooms because of injuries involving grills. Nearly half (9,500 or 48%) of the injuries were thermal burns, including both burns from fire and from contact with hot objects; 5,200 thermal burns, per year, were caused by such contact or other non-fire events.
- Children under 5 accounted for an average of 2,000 or 39%, of the contact-type burns per year. These burns typically occurred when someone, often a child, bumped into, touched or fell on the grill, grill part or hot coals.
- Gas grills were involved in an average of 8,900 home fires per year, including 3,900 structure fires and 4,900 outdoor fires annually. Leaks or breaks were primarily a problem with gas grills. Ten percent of gas grill structure fires and 22% of outside gas grill fires were caused by leaks or breaks.



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- Charcoal or other solid-fueled grills were involved in 1,300 home fires per year, including 600 structure fires and 600 outside fires annually

8 Grilling Safety Tips for Summer Barbecues

Grilling is a popular way to enjoy the nice summer weather, but grill fires can start easily and spread quickly when the gas or charcoal grill is placed too close to any fire hazards. Learn how you can help keep your home and family safe by following our grill safety tips.

1. Only use grills outside

It may be tempting to set up your barbecue grill inside of your open garage or under a covered balcony, but propane and charcoal grills are strictly designed for outdoor use where there is plenty of ventilation. Any combustible materials that surround or hang over the grill when it's in use can catch fire easily and quickly. Make sure that the area over top and around your grill is clear and unobstructed.

2. Place your grill away from your home

Barbecue grills are often placed just outside the back door or on the back deck against a railing. You should avoid placing your grill in these areas because it can pose a potential fire hazard. Grills that are placed too close to the house or other wood structures can heat up adjacent materials and cause a fire to start. Be sure to keep your grill at least 10 feet from your home or other structures.

3. Make sure your grill is located on a flat, level surface

Grills that are placed on slopes or other uneven surfaces can tip over easily and cause a fire. Make sure that your grill is set up on a stable surface such as a concrete pad so that it remains level while cooking food.

4. Check your grill for leaks

If you store your grill inside during the winter months, it's important to check it over thoroughly when grilling season begins. A leak in the gas lines can cause propane or natural gas to build up inside the BBQ when the lid is closed. Check the gas lines to make sure that they are free of leaks before using your grill, and always open the lid of your barbecue before lighting.

5. Always clean your grill after use

Barbecuing regularly causes grease to build-up on the grill plates and collect inside the grease tray. If not cleaned, the build-up can then act as fuel and catch fire while the grill is in use. Clean your charcoal or gas grill after each use with a grill brush and empty the grease tray when it begins to fill up.

6. Never leave your barbecue grill unattended while in use

Never leave the grill unattended while you are cooking food. You should never walk away from your barbecue while it's in use. Barbecues use high heat and open flames to cook food, and when left unattended can become a safety and fire hazard. If you must leave the grill, ask another adult to watch the grill for you.

7. Wear appropriate clothing

Articles of clothing that have long sleeves or pieces that dangle can catch fire easily when too close to an open flame. When grilling food, wear clothing that won't interfere with the cooking process and make sure that any apron strings are tied back away from your front. If a piece of clothing does catch fire, remember to stop, drop, and roll to extinguish the flames quickly.

8. Keep a spray bottle on hand

It's common for grills to flare up as fat drips from meat as it cooks, and this can cause a section of the grill to remain on fire as it burns away. If left alone, the flames will continue to burn and cause excess smoke to billow out from under the lid. Keep a spray bottle filled with water beside your grill so that you can quickly extinguish smaller flames before they spread.
